

#### EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME

#### INTRODUCTION

THE TABLES WHICH APPEAR IN THIS REPORT ARE DERIVED FROM THE 1960 CENSUS AND SUMMARIZE THE ESSENTIAL EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME CHARACTERISTICS OF PERSONS AND FAMILIES IN THE DETROIT METROPOLITAN AREA. THE DATA HAS BEEN BROKEN DOWN TO PROVIDE COMPARISONS BETWEEN WHITES AND NONWHITES, MALES AND FEMALES, SUBURBANIES AND CITY DWELLERS. CHANGES WHICH OCCURRED DURING THE LAST DECADE ARE ALSO SHOWN. SINCE ALMOST 99% OF THE AREA'S NONWHITE POPULATION IS NEGRO, WE HAVE USED THESE TERMS INTERCHANGEABLY.

According to the 1960 Census, there were 1,445,905 persons aged 14 and over in the Detroit Metropolitan Area Labor force. Of these, 1,245,007 were white and 200,898, or 14% were nonwhite. Males accounted for 70% or 1,008,998, of which 876,957 were white and 132,041 were nonwhite. There were 368,050 white and 68,050 nonwhite females in the total Labor force.

ALMOST 112,000 PERSONS (OR 7.7% OF THE LABOR FORCE) WERE UNEMPLOYED; OF THIS NUMBER, 29% OR 34,400 WERE NONWHITE. IN ADDITION, SOME 32,800 (2.3%) PERSONS HAD JOBS, BUT WERE NOT WORKING. OF THOSE EMPLOYED, 203,500 (14%) WERE WORKING PART TIME, 51% OF WHOM WERE FEMALE, 16%, OR 32,600 WERE NONWHITE.

Thus, of those recorded in the Labor force, 1,092,417 were employed full time, 74% were males, 12% were nonwhite. However, among white males aged 14 and over, 66% were employed full time (35 or more hours per week), while 52% of the non-white males were so employed.

WHILE THE CITY OF DETROIT ACCOUNTED FOR 44% OF THE TOTAL POPULATION IN THE METRO-POLITAN AREA, 55% OF THE AREA'S LABOR FORCE WAS EMPLOYED WITHIN THE CITY. DETROIT PROVIDES EMPLOYMENT FOR 692,700 PERSONS, 231,000 OF WHOM ARE SUBURBANITES. THE SUBURBS PROVIDED JOBS FOR 530,000 PERSONS, INCLUDING APPROXIMATELY 102,000 DETROITERS. ALMOST 60% OF THE UNEMPLOYED WERE RESIDENTS OF DETROIT.

#### INDUSTRY

WHILE NONWHITES ARE EMPLOYED IN MOST INDUSTRIES, THEY ARE SUBSTANTIALLY UNDER-REPRESENTED IN MACHINERY AND CHEMICAL MANUFACTURING, FABRICATED METALS, THE UTILITIES, BANKING AND FINANCE, AND BUSINESS, LEGAL AND ENGINEERING SERVICES. NONWHITES ACCOUNT FOR 14% OF THE TOTAL LABOR FORCE, BUT LESS THAN 6% OF THOSE WORKING IN THE FOREMENTIONED INDUSTRIES.

However, during the 1950-60 decade, substantial gains by nonwhites were made in machinery manufacturing, paper, printing and publishing, communications, business services, wholesale and retail trade, medicine and health, education and government. From several hundred to as many as 2,500 additional jobs were filled by Negroes in each of the above cited industries. Their greatest opportunities, however, continue to be found in public, professional and personal services.

AMONG MALES, SUBSTANTIAL JOB LOSSES OCCURRED IN AGRICULTURE, CONSTRUCTION, PERSONAL SERVICES, RECREATION AND ENTERTAINMENT AND THE AUTO INDUSTRY. ALMOST 78,000 JOBS WERE LOST IN THE AUTO INDUSTRY ALONE. JOB OPPORTUNITIES EXPANDED IN FABRICATED METALS, MACHINERY, PAPER, PRINTING AND PUBLISHING, WHOLESALE TRADE, BANKING AND FINANCE, BUSINESS SERVICES, EDUCATION, PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AND GOVERNMENT. EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR WOMEN INCREASED IN BANKING AND FINANCE, HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES, AND EDUCATION.

#### OCCUPATION

Occupations which have declined since 1950 include carpenters, machinists, painters, bus drivers, factory operatives and laborers. Occupations providing increased opportunities include teaching, nursing, clerical, household, drafting, engineering, lawyers and sales.

Relative to occupations, 70% of all Negroes are employed as factory operatives, service workers and Laborers, while 35% of whites are so employed. In the white-collar, professional and managerial occupations, 49% of the whites, but only 20% of the Negroes are so employed. Nonwhites comprise 2 to 6% of those employed in most white-collar occupations and 20 to 50% of those employed in various blue-collar categories.

Since education and occupation are highly related, a comparison between these factors reveals that while nonwhites account for 14% of those aged 14 and over and 9.4% of those completing high school, only 5% are employed in white-collar jobs. Furthermore, among 309,000 persons completing one or more years of college, 8% are nonwhite, while 4.3% of the managerial and professional jobs are Held by nonwhites.

Among whites, 42% have completed high school while 49% (@R 7% MORE) hold white-collar jobs. On the other hand, 27% of the nonwhites have completed high school, but only 20% (or 7% less) hold white-collar jobs. Moreover, males account for 61% of the white-collar jobs held by whites, but among nonwhites, only 48% of the white-collar jobs are held by males. Thus, the discrepancy between occupational opportunity and educational attainment becomes even greater if only males are considered.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT

According to estimates of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, 93,000 persons (or 6.7%) were unemployed as of February, 1963. However, the total Labor force declined by over 27,000 since the 1960 Census. A combination of several factors, including out migration, earlier retirements, the withdrawal of married women from the Labor market, etc., is probably responsible for this decline in the Labor force. Thus, the reduction of unemployment was not achieved through the creation of Jobs, but through worker attrition.

During the last decade, the number of males aged 14 and over increased by 12% while the increase among employed males was only 5%. Nonwhite males, aged 14 and over increased 31% while the number employed increased by 14%. On the other hand, the number of employed females, both white and nonwhite increased almost twice their total rate of increase.

Unemployment rates were considerably higher among laborers and semi-skilled operatives and lowest among professional and managerial employees. However over 50,000, or 45%, of the total unemployed were craftsmen and operatives.

Young men between the ages of 17 and 22 suffer the highest unemployment rates. Of those defined as not in the labor force and not in school, there were 121,000 white and 58,000 nonwhite between 17 and 22 who were without jobs. The problem is particularly acute among Negro youth, over half of whom were unemployed. Among white males between the ages of 25 and 65, 72% were fully employed during 1959 and only 4% did not work at all. Among nonwhite males, 46% worked the entire year and 14% were unemployed during all of 1959.

Unemployment among Negroes is consistently double, or more than that of whites. In April, 1960, the unemployment rate among Negroes was 17.4% while 7.1% of the whites were unemployed. Regardless of age, sex, occupation, industry or educational level, unemployment is consistently higher among nonwhites than among whites.

#### INCOME

According to the 1960 Census, median income of nonwhite families during 1959 was \$4,400, while median family income among whites was \$7,300, or 66% higher. Among white families, almost 65% receive incomes of over \$6,000, while among nonwhite families, 27% receive incomes of \$6,000 or more. Almost one quarter of all white families register incomes at the \$10,000 and over level, while among nonwhite families, only 6% acquire this amount.

At the other end of the scale, over 127,000 families in the Detroit area received less than \$3,000 during 1959. Approximately 43,700 or one-third of all nonwhite families are in this income category, while among white families, many of whom are retired, 10% or almost 85,000 apparently manage on incomes of less than \$3,000.

SINCE 1949, FAMILY INCOME OF WHITES INCREASED 80%, BUT NEGRO FAMILY INCOME IN-CREASED @NLY 40%, OR HALF AS MUCH. THUS, IN SPITE OF RISING EDUCATIONAL ATTAIN-MENT, THE NEGRO HAS NOT SHARED PROPORTIONATELY IN THE RISING PROSPERITY OF THE 1950's.

Only part of these differentials is due to the more extensive educational back-ground of whites. Among persons who have completed high school, 9.4% are non-whites, but of persons with incomes of \$6,000 or more, only 3.6% are nonwhite. Among whites, aged 14 and over, 15% have some college and 21% receive incomes of over \$6,000. On the other hand, while 8% of nonwhites have some college, less than 8% earn more than \$6,000 annually. These income differentials persist at every educational level, in every industry and in all occupations (see pp 18-20). On the average, even white families with one wage earner fare better than nonwhite families with two persons working. In no respect can the income differentials between whites and nonwhites be reduced to parity.

#### CONCLUSION

In this report, we have summarized the essential employment and income characteristics of persons and families in the Detroit Metropolitan Area. Secondly, prevailing differences between whites and nonwhites, Detroiters and Suburbanites, and the sexes have been highlighted. While lengthy and detailed interpretation has been held to a minimum, the reader, with care and judgment, can extract a considerable variety of data from the tables.

We have stressed in this analysis the differences between whites and nonwhites because we believe these to be much too significant and disturbing to be minimized or ignored. While references to discrimination have been avoided, the consistency and magnitude of the differences between whites and nonwhites is such that "discrimination" is the only factor that can logically account for the overwhelming differences. Corrective measures and programs, deliberately and resolutely established, are imperative.

#### ANALYSIS

INCOME DIFFERENTIALS BETWEEN WHITES AND NONWHITES IS FREQUENTLY ATTRIBUTED TO THE LOWER EDUCATIONAL LEVELS OF NONWHITES. AS THE ABOVE TABLE INDICATES, THIS IS NOT THE CASE. NOT ONLY DOES THE NUMERICAL DIFFERENCE INCREASE WITH EDUCATIONAL LEVELS, BUT THE DIFFERENCE BECOMES PROGRESSIVELY AND PROPORTIONATELY LARGER.

Among those with less than five years of school, the apparent advantage of nonwhites over whites is due to the high proportion of whites over age 65. While medium age of whites is 9 to 12 years higher than for nonwhites at the Lower Educational Levels, the age difference is only 1 to 3 years at the high school and college Level.

OF PERSONS WITH 5 TO 7 YEARS OF SCHOOL COMPLETED, INCOMES OF WHITES AND NONWHITES ARE ABOUT THE SAME, BUT AMONG THOSE COMPLETING HIGH SCHOOL, WHITES REALIZE \$1578 MORE THAN NONWHITES. AT THE COLLEGE LEVEL THIS DIFFERENTIAL INCREASES TO \$2611 IN FAVOR OF WHITES. OF MORE SIGNIFICANCE IS THE FACT THAT MEDIAN INCOMES OF WHITE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES ARE HIGHER THAN NONWHITES WITH COLLEGE DEGREES. EVEN WHITES WITH SOME HIGH SCHOOL FARE ALMOST AS WELL AS NONWHITE COLLEGE GRADUATES.

Such differentials can only serve to negate nonwhite educational efforts and aspirations. In this connection, the above table reveals that nonwhite college graduates receive incomes only \$2300 more than those with a minimum of elementary schooling and only \$1500 more than those with eight years of schooling. For whites, a college degree is worth \$5700 more than 1 to 4 years of education and \$3500 more than an eighth grade education.

While we may expect educational differences to produce income differentials, a consistently widening income gap between whites and nonwhites is hardly tenable when educational levels are held constant. The data strongly suggests that nonwhites are underemployed and as a consequence, less likely to remain in school.
