A large group of colored voters met at Second Baptist Church Tuesday evening under the leaderhip of Rev. R. L. Bradby, to inform the candidates whom they sponsored, that the Negro voters are sick and tired of voting for men for public offices, only to be forgotten after the votes were counted. They served notice on each one that if there was not something done toward giving Negroes their due according to their number they need not come back and expect support at the next election. Rev. Bradby told them that Detroit, the fourth largest city, had less Negroes in public offices and jobs, according to their population than any other city in America, and that from now or, they would take a united stand to get the rights due them as citizens.
