PRIMARIES ANALYZED

Nomination Sets New Precedent in Local Politics

Twenty Negro candidates in congressional, state and ocal contests won nominations in last week's primaries.

In the largest field of successful candidates in the history of Detroit and Michigan, nominations included the signal victory of State Senator Charles J Diggs, Jr. as candidate for Congress in the 13th Congressional district and the nomination of two Negroes to the Flint City Council.

The division of the state into legislative and state senatorial districts created lively contests which products rather than fewer candidates. In Detroit the elimination of the 21 delegates elected at contests which produced more the 21 delegates elected at large from the whole city placed an added burden of campaigning on the incumbents and increased the number of delegates to the legisla-

ture. In the Fourth legislative district where voters elected three Democrats and three Republicans, Frederick Yates, an unsuccessful candidate in the old "bed sheet ballot" days, led the

field. On the Republican side in the same district, E. W. Metcalf, Philip J. Williams and Roy Morton won the first three

spots. In the Elev-enth District, Charline White, incumbent, and George H. Ed-wards, a new-comer to politics, will oppose Robert L. Ward, Robert L. Ward, veteran Republican leader and ROBERT WARD Earl Kennedy,

a newcomer to politics.

In the Second Representative
District, Edgar Currie and

The most significant victory of the primaries was won by State Senator Charles C. Diggs, Jr., who defeated Congressman George O'Brien, a veteran of more than 15 years in the Unit-ed States Congress. Diggs, cam-paigning in a district which has undergone considerable change in the last five years, literally swamped the veteran O'Brien.

He will be pitted against Lan-

don Knight, Republican nominee in November. Only a switch in the traditionally Democratic district could possibly stop

Teaming with the William Hart ticket which is expected to poll a heavy vote in November, if the overwhelming Democratic vote in last week primaries is any indication. Diggs appears a sure

Piling up record majorities in Wayne County, Democratic office holders and candidates gave clear indications the county will remain in Democratic hands for remain, in Democratic hands for

the next two years.

The biggest test will be made by Gov. G. Mennen Williams in his precedent-breaking effort to become Michigan's first fourth term governor. The interest created in local races in Detroit, Flint, Muskegon and other in-dustrial areas may well be the key to the Democratic chances in November.
